ANCHORAGE, ALASKA AO No. 2021-91(S)

AN ORDINANCE OF THE ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL ASSEMBLY REGARDING PUBLIC HEALTH AND SAFETY MEASURES FOR THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC.

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WHEREAS, on July 27, 2021 the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) updated their public health recommendations given new evidence on the highly transmissible B.1.617.2 (Delta) variant of the virus that causes COVID-19, which is now the dominant variant circulating in Alaska and around the United States; and

WHEREAS, the CDC's updated guidance includes a recommendation that all people, including fully vaccinated people, wear a mask in public indoor settings in areas of substantial or high transmission of COVID-19; and

 WHEREAS, the CDC notes that until vaccination coverage is high, communities and organizations should regularly assess the need for prevention strategies, based on five critical factors, including: 1) level of SARS-CoV-2 community transmission; 2) health system capacity; 3) vaccination coverage; 4) capacity for early detection of increases in COVID-19 cases; and 5) populations at risk for severe outcomes from COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, despite drops in case counts this past spring and early summer, the Municipality of Anchorage (MOA), and all of Alaska, has seen a marked increase in COVID-19 cases over the past two months, and the Municipality, and most of Alaska, is currently in high alert status for per capita incidence of new cases of COVID-19, based on the total number of new reported cases per 100,000 persons in the past 7 days; and

WHEREAS, the Alaska State Hospital & Nursing Home Association, as well as representatives from hospitals in Anchorage, have expressed concerns about the capacity of our local health care system to respond to rapid increases in COVID-19 cases and related hospitalizations; and

WHEREAS, on September 1st, a record 30 patients were holding in the emergency department at Providence Hospital and the emergency room waiting area was past capacity for safe distancing, so some patients waited in their cars; and

WHEREAS, on September 1st, Jared Kosin, president and CEO of the Alaska State Hospital and Nursing Home Association told the Anchorage Daily News, "I want to be clear and on the record: We are in crisis"; and

WHEREAS, on September 2nd during testimony at a hearing of the State Legislature's House Health and Social Services Committee describing the current crisis situation to state legislators, Dr. Robert Onders of the Alaska Native Tribal

Health Consortium said "We are not doing well at all," Dave Wallace, CEO of Mat-Su Regional Medical Center said, "We are in disaster mode here," and Preston Simmons, CEO of Providence Alaska said "We are being tested like never before"; and

WHEREAS, on September 8th, there were 208 people hospitalized with the virus around the state, higher than at any other point in the pandemic, and 117 in Anchorage hospitals, according to the official Anchorage Municipal COVID-19 Data dashboard; and

WHEREAS, on August 30th, the Anchorage School District had to suspend certain student bus routes on an alternating schedule due to a shortage of drivers related to COVID-19 concerns, on September 1st the ASD Superintendent reported four classrooms in the district have had to transition to at-home learning as a result of COVID-19 spread, and on September 10th the ASD COVID-19 dashboard reports 338 active confirmed self-reported positive COVID-19 cases among enrolled students; and

WHEREAS, over the past two weeks hospitals have begun instituting additional restrictions such as pausing all visitation except for several specific exemptions: children under 18 can have one caregiver with them; women in labor can have one partner; and families can visit patients who are dying; and

WHEREAS, in late August, 26 out of 136 COVID-positive people hospitalized in Alaska were vaccinated, according to the Alaska State Hospital and Nursing Home Association, and of 33 COVID-19 patients in the ICU, five were vaccinated, and out of 18 on ventilators, one was vaccinated; and

WHEREAS, the CDC recognizes that increasing COVID-19 vaccination coverage remains the most important public health action to end the pandemic; and

WHEREAS, 59.3% of MOA residents age 12 and older have completed the full vaccination series; and

WHEREAS, children under the age of 12 are not eligible for vaccination at this time and the CDC recommends implementing other protection strategies to protect people who are not fully vaccinated; and

WHEREAS, the CDC reports that proven effective strategies against SARS-CoV-2 (COVID-19) transmission, beyond vaccination, include using masks consistently and correctly, maximizing ventilation, maintaining physical distance, and avoiding crowds; and

WHEREAS, the CDC recommends to maximize protection from the Delta variant to wear a mask indoors in public if in an area of substantial or high transmission, and to follow basic public health measures such as staying home when sick, handwashing, and regular cleaning of high-touch surfaces are also encouraged; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the MOA and its residents to update protocols at Municipal buildings to align with new public health guidance, in order to minimize

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preventable illness and death during the current surge of COVID-19 cases; and

WHEREAS, the Anchorage Health Department issues COVID-19 risk assessments and has consistently made the following recommendations to the public: (1) Get vaccinated; (2) Wear a mask in public indoor settings if in an area of substantial or high transmission; (3) Practice social distancing; (4) Wash hands for at least 20 seconds or sanitize hands frequently; and (5) Get tested if experiencing COVID-19 symptoms or are exposed to someone with COVID-19, regardless of vaccination status; and

WHEREAS, the Anchorage Health Department's risk assessment also include recommendations for local businesses that Dr. Savitt, Chief Medical Officer for the Municipality, further indicated should also apply to the Municipal workforce as well: (1) Encourage and continue to support telework when feasible; (2) Encourage use of virtual meetings versus in-person meetings when feasible; (3) Encourage event organizers to consider keeping number of participants small, encourage mask wearing and hosting events outside whenever feasible; (4) Encourage unvaccinated front line workers to get tested weekly and anyone experiencing symptoms of COVID-19 to get tested as needed to ensure continuity of critical services; (5) Consider allowing employees to get tested or vaccinated on work time; and (6) Encourage all employers to review OSHA's Guidance on Mitigating and Preventing the Spread of COVID-19 in the Workplace; and

WHEREAS, the Pfzier BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine, to be marketed as Comirnaty, received the Food and Drug Administration's first full approval for individuals age 16 and older starting on August 23, 2021, taking it out of emergency use authorization status for adults, now that it has met the high standards for safety, effectiveness, and manufacturing quality the FDA requires; and

WHEREAS, Mayor Bronson when interviewed about the challenges the Municipality is facing with regard to the effects of COVID-19, especially hospital capacity, he responded "I don't know what more we can do," consistent with his stance to not to institute Municipal areawide mandates applicable to individuals and private businesses; and

WHEREAS, management authority over Municipal buildings is vested in the Executive Branch under the Mayor per Anchorage Municipal Code section 25.20.050, and he may exercise control over Municipal land including issuing directives regulating their use; and

WHEREAS, on September 9, 2021, President Biden issued new directives to the Occupational Safety and Health Administration to require all employers with over 100 employees to mandate workers to be vaccinated or face weekly testing and will also mandate that the businesses offer employees paid time off to get vaccinated; and

WHEREAS, even though the Municipality has over 1,000 employees, on September 9th in response to the announcement about the new federal directives to OSHA, Mayor Bronson issued a statement that if the Municipality is not constitutionally required to comply with the President's directive, then he would not require it of the

 Municipal workforce, pending legal advice; and

WHEREAS, a state report by the Alaska Division of Public Health released in January 2021, on Anchorage's restrictions last summer, have shown that masking, capacity restrictions and gathering limitations help ease the burden on hospitals and prevent deaths by slowing the spread of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on September 17, 2021, Joint Base Elmendorf-Richardson (JBER) declared a public health emergency and Lieutenant General David Krumm stated "the lack of mitigation measures off-base has resulted in alarmingly high infection rates, hospitalizations and deaths in our community"; **and**

WHEREAS, the Municipality has the power to legislate for the health and welfare of Anchorage residents and visitors under Charter § 3.01, and this legislative power is vested in the Assembly, pursuant to Charter §4.01; Now therefore,

THE ANCHORAGE ASSEMBLY ORDAINS:

<u>Section 1.</u> The Assembly hereby finds that a health crisis exists with the COVID-19 pandemic based on the circumstances described in this ordinance, and that the unforeseen rapid increase in COVID-19 infections and hospitalizations have resulted in insufficiency of services by the health care system and local hospitals substantial enough to endanger the public health, safety or welfare.

<u>Section 2.</u> A substantial or high alert level occurs when either of the following two criteria are met: there are more than 50 new cases of COVID-19 per 100,000 persons in the MOA over the past 7 days; or the percentage of positive COVID-19 tests in the past 7 days exceeds 8%. So long as the Municipality of Anchorage is in the substantial or high alert level for community transmission of COVID-19 and at any time the Municipality of Anchorage again reaches one of these levels, the requirements of this ordinance shall be in effect.

<u>Section 3.</u> All individuals must wear masks or face coverings over their noses and mouths when they are (a) indoors in public settings or communal spaces outside the home; or (b) outdoors at large crowded public events, <u>regardless of whether they have been vaccinated for COVID-19</u>. Unvaccinated individuals are additionally encouraged to wear masks at all outdoor public gatherings, regardless of size.

- A. A face shield is generally not permitted in lieu of a mask or face covering, as face shields are less effective in stopping the spread of COVID-19. However, face shields may be permitted in lieu of a mask or face covering for the following individuals, who must wear a face shield whenever a mask or face covering would be required unless it is impossible to do so:
 - Any individual who cannot tolerate a mask due to a physical or mental disability;
 - 2. Individuals who are communicating with someone who is deaf

or hard of hearing;

- 3. Individuals performing an activity that cannot be conducted or safely conducted while wearing a mask (for example, a driver experiencing foggy glasses, a dental patient receiving care, an equipment operator where there is a risk of dangerous entanglement).
- 4. Employers must make sure employees who are present in the workplace have access to and wear masks or face coverings when with the public or unvaccinated coworkers.

<u>Section 4.</u> This Ordinance does not apply to the following categories of people or activities:

- A. Any child under the age of 2 years. Additionally, masks are recommended, but not required, for children ages 2-5. Daycare settings that serve preschool children are encouraged but not required to enforce mask usage for children age 2 and older.
- B. Individuals who are incarcerated, in police custody, or inside a courtroom; these individuals should follow guidance particular to their location or institution.
- C. Presenters, musicians, others communicating to an audience or being recorded, if they are 10 feet from the audience and all members of the audience are wearing masks or face coverings.
- D. Individuals removing their masks or face coverings to eat, drink, or briefly scratch an itch.
- E. Employees within their own fully enclosed office or workspace or within an unenclosed workspace if they are totally alone.
- F. Fully vaccinated employees working in a separate room from the public and unvaccinated coworkers. Employers wishing to utilize this exception must verify their employees' vaccination status in a manner consistent with workplace anti-discrimination laws.
- G. Individuals while they are swimming, diving, or participating in an organized or sanctioned athletic activity or competition where distancing is not possible or practical (such as running, hockey, football, volleyball, and wrestling); however, for indoor sports, athletes will still wear masks while on the sidelines [OR COMPETIVELY WRESTLING].
- H. Individuals performing an activity that cannot be conducted or safely conducted while wearing a mask.
- I. Individuals who cannot tolerate a mask due to physical or mental disability.

Section 5. Businesses and building owners shall deny admittance to any individual who fails to comply with this Ordinance and shall require or compel removal of such individuals from the premises. Provided, however, that this regulation shall be applied in a manner consistent with the federal Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and any other applicable provision of law. Businesses may choose to allow individuals who request an accommodation under the ADA to wear a face shield, or may consider accommodating these individuals through alternate means of providing goods or services, such as curbside, delivery, or telephonic service.

Section 6. Facilities in the ownership or control of the Municipality of Anchorage shall comply with Section 5 of this Ordinance. The Municipal Manager, Real Estate Department Director, and head of the department with management authority over a Municipal facility is hereby authorized to interpret and apply the exceptions in Section 4.

Section 7. When the Municipality of Anchorage is in the substantial or high alert level for community transmission of COVID-19, as defined in Section B, the Municipality of Anchorage shall:

Α. Support telework for employees when feasible.

B. Notwithstanding municipal code, use virtual meetings versus inperson meetings when feasible. Video conferencing is preferred.

C. Keep all events and gatherings to a small number of participants, encourage mask wearing, and host events outside when feasible.

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D. Encourage front line workers to get tested weekly and also when experiencing COVID-19 symptoms.

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Ε. Allow employees to get tested and vaccinated on work time.

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Section 8. The Anchorage Assembly requests the Mayor strongly encourage, through public health communication platforms and on his own behalf as Mayor,

Α. the use of masks in public indoor spaces, regardless of vaccination status;

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В. vaccinations for those residents who are eligible to get vaccinated; and

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C. observance of physical distancing, limiting gatherings, and avoiding crowds.

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Section 9. The Anchorage Assembly recommends and encourages all people to practice effective strategies to prevent the spread of COVID-19, including getting vaccinated, maintaining physical distance, avoiding crowds, and practicing basic public health measures such as staying home when sick, handwashing, and regular cleaning of high-touch surfaces. The Assembly requests the Mayor issue public health information, including periodic briefings, to the public consistent with these

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recommendations.

Section 10. The Municipality reserves the right to use all available enforcement options to assure compliance with this ordinance [ORDER], including seeking civil fines and injunctive relief. Enforcement may occur under AMC sections 15.05,070 or 15.20.020. Definitions of terms in Title 15 applicable to those sections are incorporated by this ordinance, except as to defined terms in Section 11. Violation of orders to cease activity in violation of this ordinance or to comply with this ordinance may be prosecuted under AMC section 8.30.010. Each day of violation of any provision of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense.

- Upon application for injunctive relief and a finding that a person <u>A.</u> is violating or threatening to violate any provision of this ordinance, or any order issued pursuant to this ordinance, the superior court shall grant injunctive relief to restrain the violation.
- Violation of this ordinance [ORDER] does not create grounds for В. residents to harass individuals who do not comply with it. **Any person** aggrieved by a violation of this ordinance may initiate a private enforcement action before the administrative hearings officer to abate the violation.
 - A private enforcement action is commenced upon filing of <u>1.</u> a written complaint to the administrative hearings officer. The complaint must identify by name and description or street address the property involved, the business name if the violation involves a business entity, the record owner of the property, the provision of this ordinance alleged to be violated, and the facts upon which the complaint is based. The provisions of Title 14 apply to the initiated proceeding.
- <u>C.</u> The Assembly hereby refers civil violations of this ordinance to the jurisdiction of the administrative hearings officer pursuant to AMC subsection 14.20.020A.3. Fines shall be in accordance with the fine schedule in AMC section 14.60.030 for violations of AMC section 15.20.020A (first offense \$50.00-\$300.00, second and subsequent offense \$300.00-\$600.00). Enforcement of AHO orders may be pursued by the Municipality under AMC section 14.20.030.

Section 11. Definitions.

- Α. "Mask" means a medical grade mask.
- B. "Face covering" means a cloth, polypropylene, paper or other face covering that covers the nose and the mouth and that rests snugly above the nose, below the mouth, and on the sides of the face.

1 2 1. The following are not face coverings because they allow droplets to be released: a covering that incorporates a valve 3 that is designed to facilitate easy exhalation, mesh masks, lace 4 masks or other coverings with openings, holes, visible gaps in 5 the design or material, or vents. 6 7 C. "Face shield" means a clear plastic shield that covers the forehead. 8 extends below the chin, and wraps around the sides of the face. 9 10 D. "Fully vaccinated" individual is an individual who has received a 11 COVID-19 vaccine where at least two weeks have elapsed since 12 receipt of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine or two weeks since the 13 second dose of the Moderna or Pfizer vaccines. 14 15 E. "Unvaccinated" individual means any individual who is not fully 16 vaccinated. 17 18 "Large crowded public events" means events such as live F. 19 performances, parades, and sporting events bringing together a 20 multitude of individuals from different households where six feet of 21 physical distancing between household groups is not maintained. 22 23 24 Section 12. This Ordinance shall be effective immediately upon passage and approval by the Assembly. This ordinance shall expire December 31, 2021, without 25 further action by the Assembly.
