Subject: AO 2023-17 - AN ORDINANCE OF THE ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL ASSEMBLY AMENDING ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL CODE SECTION 3.30.141 TO INCLUDE JUNETEENTH AND INDIGENOUS PEOPLES' DAY, BUT NOT SEWARD'S DAY, AS PAID MUNICIPAL HOLIDAYS, AND CHANGING WASHINGTON'S BIRTHDAY TO PRESIDENTS' DAY, REQUESTING THE SAME TO BE RECOGNIZED HOLIDAYS IN LABOR AGREEMENTS, AND WAIVING PERSONNEL RULES COMMITTEE REVIEW.

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The month of February is an important time to collectively celebrate the contributions, achievements and history of Black people in our community, whose impact has been historically overlooked and undervalued. The same is true of our Indigenous community and their impacts and stewardship of the land and culture of Alaska. For those reasons, and others, this ordinance is timely.

This ordinance makes important changes to recognized holidays for municipal employees in Anchorage Municipal Code (AMC) Section 3.30.141. While removing one holiday (Seward's Day), this measure will add two culturally significant days to the roster: Juneteenth and Indigenous Peoples' Day. It also changes the day previously observed as Washington's Birthday to Presidents' Day.

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Washington's Birthday to Presidents' Day

The change in name of the recognized holiday from Washington's Birthday to Presidents' Day follows a popular trend throughout the country. While the federal holiday remains Washington's Birthday, many states and localities moved the holiday to the third Monday in February, calling it Presidents' Day (some called it Washington & Lincoln's Birthday). The State of Alaska observes Presidents' Day. This ordinance would adopt Presidents' Day in lieu of Washington's Birthday.

Seward's Day

Most communities that list Seward's Day as a paid holiday do not have widely 35 celebrated events surrounding the holiday, nor is this day tied to a particular cultural 36 group of residents. Further, Seward's Day has a mixed history in the Municipality of 37 Anchorage. It was first added as a holiday in 1979, then removed in 1999 to allow 38 for the addition of Martin Luther King Jr. Day, and later added back as an additional 39 paid holiday in 2014. Given this on-again-off-again history, the lack of celebratory 40 significance of this holiday to the community, and in order to balance the two new 41 holidays added by this ordinance, netting only one new paid holiday, the sponsors 42 chose Seward's Day as the most reasonable for removal. 43

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<u>Juneteenth</u>

Juneteenth has become widely observed throughout the United States in recent years – first becoming an official state holiday in Texas in 1980, with three states following by 2000. Over the next two decades, Juneteenth has become officially recognized or observed in all but one state. Finally, in 2021 it became the first new federal holiday since Martin Luther King, Jr. Day was adopted in 1983.

Although Juneteenth commemorates an event in Galveston, Texas, the significance of the Emancipation Proclamation finally reaching the last of the states and its enslaved people resonates with all Americans. -It is often simply described as the oldest nationally celebrated commemoration of the ending of slavery in the United States. Adding this holiday to the paid municipal holidays is a natural step in the progression of the Municipality's ongoing recognition of African Americans in Anchorage and Alaska, whose contributions have been greater than their numbers.

Juneteenth has come to be a large celebration in Anchorage with a "Juneteenth 17 Citywide Celebration" on the Delaney Park Strip each year, featuring performers, 18 vendors, and more, bringing together community through education, unity and 19 advocacy and sponsored by nonprofit group Juneteenth Anchorage. The 20 Municipality of Anchorage first sponsored this event in 1998. The Assembly has 21 recognized Juneteenth Day by resolution every year since 2012. Ensuring Municipal 22 employees' ability to participate in this holiday and related activities is an important 23 reason for adding it to the list of paid holidays in AMC 3.30.141. Federal employees 24 receive Juneteenth as a paid holiday; adding it as a Municipal holiday would provide 25 more consistency for residents. 26

The sponsors and recent Assemblies have honored the legacy of Anchorage's African American community, and this measure is a natural step in those efforts.

Indigenous Peoples' Day

In 2015, both Governor Bill Walker and Mayor Ethan Berkowitz issued proclamations in conjunction with the Native Peoples Institute Elders and Youth Conference recognizing Indigenous Peoples' Day, but neither of these measures were permanent, nor did they establish an official holiday.

This ordinance would add Indigenous Peoples' Day to the list of paid municipal 38 holidays. The Municipality has been working towards regular and meaningful 39 recognition of the impact of Indigenous peoples - particularly Alaska Natives - on 40 our community and state. The land acknowledgement read at every Assembly 41 meeting, the government-to-government relationship with the Native Village of 42 Eklutna (NVE), and a growing emphasis on honoring the official naming policy, 43 requiring that Indigenous place names be given priority, all are valuable indications 44 of the Municipality's commitment to recognition of Indigenous Peoples. Observance 45 46 of Indigenous Peoples' Day as a paid municipal holiday is fitting.

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Commitment to BIPOC Communities

1 Significant investments have been made in the African American and BIPOC (Black, 2 Indigenous and People of Color) communities of Anchorage in the past few years. 3 Most recently, CARES and ARPA funds (Federal COVID recovery measures) were 4 carefully invested in projects committed to making improvements in BIPOC 5 communities from the following organizations: 6 Alaska Black Caucus 7 Alaska Village Initiatives 8 Cook Inlet Housing Authority 9 Enlaces 10 Mountain View Health Services 11 Pacific Community of Alaska 12 • Partners for Progress, Inc. 13 Polynesian Association of Alaska 14 Shiloh Community Housing 15 Umoja Coworking and Incubator 16 17 The Assembly meets on a quarterly basis with the Alaska Black Caucus for a 18 roundtable discussion. Also guarterly, the Assembly participates in meetings with 19 the Native Village of Eklutna Tribal Council as part of the government-to-government 20 relationship. The Assembly regularly consults with the NVE President on matters 21 affecting the Tribe, such as the Eklutna Hydroelectric Project and its impact on the 22 efforts related to restoration of the Eklutna River. 23 24 Recognition of Juneteenth and Indigenous Peoples' Day as paid municipal holidays 25 would further communicate the Municipality of Anchorage's commitment to its 26 providing culturally relevant holidays for its employees and their community. 27 28 29 Effect of Ordinance 30 Countless studies show direct correlation between time off and greater productivity 31 of workers. Work-life balance is imperative for worker retention, and the Municipality 32 is recently struggling to retain employees in every department. This ordinance seeks 33 to provide more time for employees to spend recharging, to provide the ability to 34 observe meaningful holidays and to potentially increase productivity through a more 35 productive, happier workforce. Any cost of additional time off could be recovered not 36 only through greater productivity, but multiple times over through worker retention 37 and the savings gained through reduced hiring and training costs. 38 39 Waiving Review by the Personnel Rules Committee 40 41 The ordinance has not been reviewed by the Personnel Rules Committee (PRC). 42 43

The ordinance has not been reviewed by the Personnel Rules Committee (PRC).
The committee has been functionally unable to provide feedback on personnel
matters, as the board that approves PRC membership, the Human Resources
Advisory Board, has only one member and is unable to achieve a quorum. The
ordinance waives that requirement.
