## ANCHORAGE, ALASKA AR No. 2021-XXX

1A RESOLUTION OF THE ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL ASSEMBLY JOINING AND2RECOGNIZING OTHER ELECTED OFFICIALS IN CONDEMNING THE3VIOLENCE AT THE U.S. CAPITOL AND URGING CITIZENS TO WORK4TOGETHER TO STRENGTHEN AND PROTECT OUR CHERISHED5DEMOCRATIC INSTITUTIONS.

**WHEREAS**, on January 6, 2021, a protest devolved into riot and the U.S. Capitol building was seized by President Trump's supporters seeking to stop the certification of the election, resulting in the deaths of five Americans, including a Capitol police officer, who was bludgeoned with a fire extinguisher by the rioters, and also resulting in injuries to more than 50 other police officers, including one who was filmed being dragged down the Capitol steps and beaten with the pole of an American flag, thus ending 223 years of peaceful transitions of power in the U.S.; and

**WHEREAS**, Alaska's congressional delegation, governor and many other state and local elected officials, including Acting Mayor Quinn-Davidson, have condemned this violent attack on the Capitol; and

WHEREAS, assaults on democracy reach all levels of government and it's incumbent on each one of us as Americans – as Alaskans – as residents of the Municipality of Anchorage (MOA) -- to work together to protect and improve our democratic processes, to uphold the rule of law and engage in civil discourse with each other with peaceful dissent to ensure that the bounties of freedom are equitably shared among us; and

**WHEREAS**, the Assembly recognizes that this has been an extraordinarily challenging time for our community, due to a prolonged recession, economic, social and racial inequalities, disagreements over the MOA response to COVID-19 and CARES Act appropriations, along with hardships caused by the pandemic that have resulted in economic distress, fatigue, frustration and anger; and

**WHEREAS**, these challenges have caused people to shake off apathy and become passionately engaged with their government, leading to new collaborations, invigorated citizen engagement and great hope; and

**WHEREAS**, the Assembly seeks to strengthen local democratic processes by encouraging citizens to work together to foster robust civil discourse and engage in local government with the goal of improving our beloved community for all persons.
