## ANCHORAGE, ALASKA AR No. 2023-303

A RESOLUTION OF THE ANCHORAGE ASSEMBLY OPPOSING A PRIVATE LEASE REQUEST SUBMITTED TO THE ALASKA RAILROAD CORPORATION (ARRC) WHICH IS IN DIRECT CONFLICT WITH THE ANCHORAGE METROPOLITAN AREA TRANSPORTATION (AMATS) ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION PROJECT KNOWN AS THE FISH CREEK TRAIL CONNECTION.

**WHEREAS**, the Fish Creek Trail Connection project promises a wide array of benefits to Anchorage residents and visitors, from community and economic development to public health and quality of life. The development of the trail would become and asset that enriches the lives of residents and visitors; and

**WHEREAS**, the Fish Creek Trail Connection project has been a priority for Anchorage since it was first identified in the 1997 Areawide Trails Plan; and

WHEREAS, in 2016 Turnagain Community Council, in which the proposed trail connection is located, passed a resolution supporting the Fish Creek Trail to the Ocean Working Group's formal request to the Municipality of Anchorage (MOA) to work with stakeholders and the public to develop and maintain a non-motorized trail in the Fish Creek watershed corridor, from West Northern Lights Boulevard to the Tony Knowles Coastal Trail, noting that a development of a trail in the area enjoyed wide community support and was recognized as being appropriate to local planning priorities; and

**WHEREAS**, a "Fish Creek Trail Connection to the Ocean" was added to the Anchorage Parks & Recreation Department's 2016-2017 workplan, with a specific trail route to be determined; and

**WHEREAS**, AMATS and the Fish Creek Trail Connection project team have worked closely with ARRC since 2017 to scope the Fish Creek Trail Connection project to ensure that the project meets the goals of the railroad to improve safety and minimize trespass in railroad right-of-way; and

**WHEREAS**, in 2020, AMATS in partnership with the State of Alaska DOT&PF and the MOA formalized an agreement to begin design and engineering work on the Fish Creek Trail Connection and have collectively invested over \$1.5 million on the project to date; and

**WHEREAS**, several alternatives routes were considered in the planning phases of the Fish Creek Trail Connection with most public comments advocating for reduced environmental impacts, particularly on the estuary and wetlands; and

WHEREAS, the Great Land Trust, holder of a conservation easement on the Fish Creek Estuary, has stated that building trail route alternatives within the estuary requires the trail to be unpaved, cannot diminish the Conservation Values of the protected property, and could only be constructed with prior approval of the US Fish and Wildlife Service and Alaska Department of Natural Resources, and instead recommended the MOA follow its 1997 Areawide Trails Plan to establish a trail corridor in cooperation with ARRC within the railroad right-of-way, and further noted that Alternative Route N3 would cause the least impacts to the last remaining undeveloped estuary in the city; and

WHEREAS, the chosen route was identified as the least impactful to the estuary and to private property, as well as being the most attainable from a cost perspective. It is estimated that alternative northern routes would add an additional \$4 to \$8 million in project costs, and could more than double the impact on wetlands; and

WHEREAS, on August 18, 2023, ARRC published a public notice of a proposal to issue a ground lease of a portion of Lot 2 of US Survey 9083, for a proposed term of lease not to exceed 95 years, for personal use access; and

WHEREAS, the project team evaluated several alternatives based on costs, feasibility, stakeholder, and community input, with the preferred alternative route identifying the lease property in question as the most suitable location for the Fish Creek Trail Connection to connect to the Tony Knowles Coastal Trail; and

WHEREAS, the proposed property for lease will not have any direct bearing on access to private lands or homes, and driveway access to the private residence is located within AKRR right-of-way and on private property, and does not include any portion of the proposed lease area. Thus, if the property is not leased to the private property owner, the property owner would still have driveway access to their residence; and

WHEREAS, on August 25, 2023, the AMATS Policy Committee submitted a letter to Andrew Donovan, Director of Real Estate for the ARRC, respectfully requesting the Alaska Railroad Corporation refrain from accepting this lease which is in direct conflict with the AMATS active transportation project known as the Fish Creek Trail Connection; and

WHEREAS, should the proposed lease be granted, it is highly likely that the Fish Creek Trail Connection project will be unable to proceed; and

WHEREAS, the ARRC Board of Directors will meet on September 22, 2023, to deliberate on the lease and will take comments on the item until September 21, 2023; now, therefore

THE ANCHORAGE ASSEMBLY RESOLVES to submit this resolution as the Assembly's official comments to the ARRC Board of Directors, respectfully requesting the Board refrain from issuing this lease to J.L. McCarrey III, Barbara N. McCarrey, Kristin McCarrey and Eric Finseth, as approval would likely halt the long-awaited development of the Fish Creek Trail Connection project.
